Bonnie's strong belief in God and love of cooking came from her mother, her grandmother Webb, and her beloved aunt Cecil. Bonnie loved the country life and the many, many friends she made there through the years. Her elementary and high school friends provided a continuous source of encouragement and love. The love of her life was her husband, James. James and Bonnie, met, fell in love, and were married in 1974. Through the years, James and Bonnie prospered with Bonnie working for the State of Tennessee (Labor and Workforce Development) and James working as a master electrician; together they amassed a collection of antiques and collectibles that would rival any museum. Their passion of living and working together produced both beautiful homes and meticulously landscaped lawns. Although without heirs, James and Bonnie had numerous feline children, that were honored with parties, love, and most important a full run of the house. When Bonnie was stricken with a brain tumor in 2008, James and Bonnie's mother and brother Roy, put their life on hold to assist with her treatment and care.
